



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

TIM DAVIS

I enlisted in the U.S. Navy in January of 1978, but a career in the service was not initially part of my plan. However, joining the Navy opened doors to experiences that I never imagined, allowing me to find focus, enjoy the experience, and exceed my expectations.

As a young sailor, I eagerly volunteered for the submarine service, drawn by the prospect of serving alongside some of the brightest minds in the Navy. My time aboard the fast attack nuclear sub, USS Guardfish, was both exhilarating and challenging. Our missions ranged from daring rescue attempts, such as during the Iranian Embassy siege, to clandestine operations like deploying listening devices in Russian territorial waters. Tracking Russian subs through deep waters became routine for us, a task we handled with ease.

My stint in the submarine service paved the way for diverse experiences such

as managing a calibration laboratory at North Island, San Diego and serving as Ship Superintendent on the USS McKee AS-41 (submarine repair ship). My duties included managing refits for deep submergence rescue vehicles and also for the USS Houston SSN 713.

During my time on board the USS McKee, I had the privilege of serving under three Commanding Officers. Among them, Captain A.E. Walther, USN, stood out as a mentor and great example of leadership. Under his guidance, I achieved the distinction of being the first enlisted man to qualify as Officer of the Deck (underway). This role saw me navigating the large ship through the challenging waters of the Straits of Hormuz during Desert Shield

I am honored to have been awarded Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medals (2), Meritorious Unit Commendations (2), Kuwait Liberation Medal (Saudi), Southwest Asia Service Medals (2), Expert Rifleman & Pistol Medals, Good Conduct Medals (5), and Navy Battle Efficiency Ribbons (4).

Following my tour, I was directed to San Diego State University to pursue an engineering degree, and it is there that I met my lovely bride.



As your Mayor, I am excited to share some of the highlights from our recent State of the City events. I want to extend my heartfelt thanks to all who attended. Your participation and engagement are what make our city a dynamic place to live.

For those who couldn't make it, you can visit peoriaaz.gov/ stateofthecity, where you can view the entire April 3rd Kickoff event and the 2024 State of the City video. These events serve as a platform for us to come together, reflect on our achievements, and discuss our plans for the future.

During the State of the City, we celebrated two significant victories that will undoubtedly mark pivotal moments along our city's future path.


The first is the redevelopment of Peoria's Historic Downtown. For nearly three decades, Peoria has been striving to revitalize our Historic Downtown area. I'm

proud to announce that this goal is now becoming a reality. The Peoria City Council recently voted to develop multiple eateries in downtown Peoria as part of a larger redevelopment project for the area in which our city was founded.

This project welcomes East Valley-based Caldwell County BBQ to our side of town and introduces a new food and event hall called Jefferson House. Caldwell County BBQ will be located along Washington Street, while Jefferson House will find its home at the northwest corner of 83rd Avenue and Jefferson

Street. Modeled after The Churchill, an immensely popular spot in downtown Phoenix, Jefferson House will offer approximately 21,000 square feet dedicated to independent, local dining and retail, along with meeting and event space in the middle.

Hungry for more exciting news? Peoria has engaged in serious discussions with the Arizona State Land Department to make available 8,300 acres within our planning area for new development. As Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Company's semiconductor plant emerges along the 303 Corridor, and the announcement for a \$2 billion Amkor semiconductor test and packaging plant in Peoria, these discussions signal an exciting future for our city's growth.

Our vision includes the designation of two major areas for development. The first is the North Peoria Gateway, spanning 1,621 acres along the Loop 303 just southwest of the Vistancia master-planned community. This area will offer a mix of residential and commercial

uses, potentially including shopping, education, or healthcare facilities.

The second area, known as the Peoria Innovation Core, encompasses approximately 6,700 acres of state land along Lake Pleasant Parkway from the Loop 303 up north to State Route 74 near the Phoenix-Peoria border. This region holds immense potential as a regional economic development hub, focusing on industries such as medical, aerospace and defense, and advanced manufacturing.

As we move forward with these plans, we remain committed to engaging with our community every step of the way. Your input and feedback are invaluable as we shape the future of Peoria together.

Thank you once again for your continued support and participation in our city's progress. Together, we are working to build a brighter, more vibrant future for all residents of Peoria.

n the window of the Lapidary and Beading studio, you will see a series of beautiful, shiny, interesting, one-of-a kind pendants. These are made with dichroic glass.

What is dichroic glass? It is a special unique kind of glass that changes color under different lighting and from different angles. The word dichroic comes from Greek root: "di" meaning two and "chroma "meaning colors. The "two" indicates that there are layers of glass and colors. There are sheets of dichroic glass available in a multitude of colors and patterns. It is fun to choose your colors of glass and to put things together. Pendants,

BROWN SUGAR FRUIT DIP

Our Quail Ridge neighbors recently got together for an outdoor party.

Our host, Kathy Margolis served this delicious brown sugar dip that everyone went crazy over. She used a packaged mix so we discovered the ingredients and experimented to create this recipe. I hope you like it!

INGREDIENTS:

- 8 oz softened cream cheese
- 8 oz sour cream
- 1 cup brown sugar (lightly packed)
- 1/4 tsp vanilla
- ½ cup Heath Bar candy bits
- ¼ tsp extra coarse salt

PROCEDURE:

- Let cream cheese sit out at room temperature for 20 – 30 minutes
- Beat the softened cream cheese with an electric mixer until smooth
- Add sour cream, vanilla, and candy bits
- Mix all ingredients (except salt) until well blended
- Put into a serving bowl


When ready to serve sprinkle with coarse salt

This is a great dip for sliced apples, strawberries, oranges, or shortbread cookies. Put the dip in a small bowl in the center of a platter and surround it with various fruit slices.

Note: dip can be made up to a day before but don't add the salt until ready to serve.

Day Trip Destination Series: Fountain Hills, AZ

Wanting to change up the scenery for a bit? Hoping to sleep in your own comfy bed tonight, so overnighters are out of the question? Day trips afford a fresh take on things without the travel arrangements and suitcase packing. It is also fun to experience our greater Valley in greater measure without going very far.

ur first day trip in this series takes us to Fountain Hills. Nestled in a beautiful valley and surrounded by the McDowell Mountains, the drive is a scant 37 miles from WV.

The town of Fountain Hills is best known for its centerpiece— a gigantic fountain. The fountain was built in 1970 by Robert McCulloch the year before reconstruction of the London Bridge in Lake Havasu City, another of McCulloch's projects. The fountain is positioned at the center of a man-made lake and sprays water for about fifteen minutes every hour, at the top of the hour. It is the second tallest in the U.S., and fourth tallest in the world.

Fountain Hills also boasts over 150 pieces of publicly displayed artwork in and around its public buildings. The city's website beckons with: "Residents and visitors are invited to wander

the streets or take the 'Art Walk' guided tour." The area is also designated as a "dark sky town," where star-gazing is a favorite activity for those who wish to linger after the sun goes down.

Make sure to visit The River of Time Museum, which contains information about the lower Verde River Valley area from prehistoric times to the creation of Fountain Hills, as well as historical records of the Yavapai Nation at Fort McDowell

For dining near the fountain area, if you are hankering for Italian food, look no further than Arrivaderci Cucina Italiana. Or perhaps you have a special occasion you'd like to combine with the day trip? Cielo Restaurant at the Adero Scottsdale Resort is perched above the valley, looking down upon the Fountain Hills Valley. It deserves a splurge for the expansive views and the atmosphere.

Janis Joplin told us it's "summertime, and the living is easy." While summer brings a new list of fun things to do in Westbrook Village, it also ushers in some summer security concerns. The temperatures in summer cause some of our residents to partially open their garage doors because they believe it will help them vent the heat. A partial opening of the garage door does little to vent heat buildup. Garage heat comes primarily as radiation from the roof area (attic heat buildup) and since heat rises, the highest temperatures are at the top of the garage not the bottom where you partially opened the door. The partial opening, however, is an invitation for animals and reptiles to seek shade, and an opportunity for any nefarious passersby to pick up a new golf driver or other easy to grab item. If heat buildup in the garage is an issue for you, consider an attic fan or vent system. The risk versus the temperature reduction afforded by a partially open garage door is just not worth it.


Theft from an open garage is the single most common petty theft in retirement communities (next to clubs left on an unattended golf carts). It's recommended that garage doors be closed when you are not in the garage.

Summer means we are outside a lot. One of the things for which the Posse is always on the lookout is for residents

who may have fallen. We've had to assist in a number of incidents and it's one of our biggest concerns. For safety, try to stay out of the rocky areas of your lawn unless someone knows you are there--especially in the back yard or in areas where you can't be seen. Always carry your phone with you so that if you fall and have difficulty getting up, you can call for help.

The Posse is privileged to see how neighbors check on each other and call us when they feel something is amiss. We encourage everyone to get to know your next-door neighbors and talk about letting each other know when you are leaving town or have an issue.

WVA Treasurer's Report

For the month ending March 31, 2024

"The following figures are subject to audit. However, they fairly represent the approximate financial condition of the Association at month end."

GENERAL OPERATING FUND

(Funds designated for day-to-day operations.)

Cash and CDs on hand at the end of March was \$3.4 million. For the full year 2024 we are forecasting total revenue of \$3.3 million, of which \$3.0 million will come from homeowner annual assessments. Budgeted expenses forecast for 2024 is \$3.3 million with \$125,000 expected to transfer to our Reserve Fund. Through March, our revenue and expenses are in line with our forecast. However, we continue to monitor expenditures, and experience higher pricing in products, labor, and availability. In addition, there remains a large "unknown" as to what may lie ahead with regards to home resales, interest rates and the overall economy in 2024.

REPLACEMENT RESERVE FUND

(Funds for major repairs / replacements / improvements)

Cash and CDs on hand at the end of March was \$4.1 million. In 2024 we are forecasting revenue of \$782,000. Revenue comes primarily from new homeowner preservation fees \$125,000 transferred from the Operating Fund and interest of approximately \$24,000. Reserve fund expenditures budgeted for 2024 is \$952,000. Ongoing expenditures remain planned for perimeter wall repair and painting, Lakes Complex Asphalt replacement, and the Fitness Center Architect. Other normal infrastructure repairs and replacement and expenditures will be addressed as needed.

These financials will be on file at the WVA Administration Office after noon on Thursday, May 2, 2024, and may be reviewed by Association members. Should you have any questions, please call 623 561-0099 for an appointment.

- If you come across maintenance needed at our facilities, please stop at any front desk, and ask staff to submit a maintenance request. They will immediately submit



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

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
