



In closing, I hope you enjoy all the glorious offerings that this active community has to offer and that you have a fabulous March in Westbrook Village!







WILLIAM "BILL" EICHLER

In 1981 at 39 years old Bill joined the Navy Reserves, rejecting an offer to join a SeaBee Battalion. He declined and accepted an offer for assignment to a naval aviation unit.

Bill began participating in monthly drills at Naval Air Station, Glenview, Illinois, and was temporarily assigned to a work center, where he tested and repaired essential aircraft flight controls equipment. After two months, he was transferred to a reserve unit at Glenview Naval Base, stationed in NAS Adak Alaska, and was assigned to the Calibration Lab, where he tested and repaired aircraft flight equipment.

Six months later, Bill applied for and received a transfer to Aviation Unit VR51, which had dual Stations at NAS Glenview, Illinois and NAS Oakland, California (split squadron). He applied for aircrew status and began learning the flight systems for VR51's planes, specifically the C118 (cargo aircraft), which had four prop engines.

Before he could complete training on C118 aircraft systems, the Navy decommissioned the C118 and replaced it with the twin jet engine DC9, which transported palletized

cargo and passenger planes, and which was configured with a hydraulic side cargo door (a door which required continual safety maintenance).

Bill started training on DC9 systems at Scott Airforce Base in Southern Illinois. Following three months, he returned to Glenview to train as Plane Captain. After certification, he began physiology and swim

qualifications at NAS Jacksonville, FL to prepare him for aircrew assignment. He was accepted as a flight attendant and began probationary flight status. After certification and fulfilling the required number of flight hours, he was sent to Dobbins Airforce Base, Marietta, GA to begin training as Loadmaster on DC9 aircraft.



The NAS Glenview Military Base, Illinois was decommissioned in 1992, and since there was no hope for hope for flight status, Bill transferred to Carrier Groups 1169 and began training for drill Instructor. After certification, he began training reserves for various units within the Naval Commands at Great Lakes.

Bill became Lead Drill Instructor for Reserve Commands at Great Lakes, teaching four weekends a month until his retirement in July 2002.

Bill also retired as a Commercial & Industrial Master Electrician in 2004. He and his wife, Joanne, moved to Westbrook Village in July 2024 and feel blessed to be able to be near and enjoy their grandkids.

We honor you, Bill Eichler, and are grateful for your service to our country!

At sixteen, he was kidnapped by Irish pirates and taken from Britain to Ireland. He was forced to work as a shepherd in a remote area of Northern Ireland. He lost everything. What he did have was prayer. St. Patrick described it in his writings this way: "Tending flocks was my daily work. I would pray constantly. The love of God and fear of him surrounded me and my faith grew. I would say as many as a hundred prayers, even while I remained in the woods or on the mountain. I would wake and pray before daybreak—through snow, frost, rain, because the Spirit within me was ardent."

The word "ardent" he used captures the essence of an intimate walk with God. It is a walk that is borne of desire to know Him more completely than merely in name and what we know about Him. It is developed by our very own heart hunger. The resulting intimacy with Him knows no boundaries—it is not subject to age, life station, vocation, location, or physical limitations. "And let him that is thirsty come. And whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely (Rev. 22:17). Also, "You will seek me and find me, when you seek me with all your heart (Jeremiah 29:13).

Many years ago, in one of the largest concert halls in England, Bill Mann was singing for a large crusade, when someone approached him before a service and said, 'The Prime Minister's wife, Mrs. Harold Wilson, would like to make a request. Would you sing a song for her?' Her request was for the song, "Fill My Cup, Lord."

Like the woman at the well, I was seeking For things that could not satisfy. And then I heard my Savior speaking— "Draw from My well that never shall run dry."

Fill my cup, Lord; I lift it up Lord; Come and quench this thirsting of my soul. Bread of Heaven, feed me till I want no more. Fill my cup, fill it up and make me whole.

There are millions in this world who are seeking For pleasures earthly goods afford. But none can match the wondrous treasure That I find in Jesus Christ my Lord.

So my brother if the things that this world gives you Leave hungers that won't pass away, My blessed Lord will come and save you If you kneel to Him and humbly pray—





WVA Treasurer's Report

For the month ending December 31, 2024

"The following figures are subject to audit. However, they fairly represent the approximate financial condition of the Association at month end."

GENERAL OPERATING FUND

(Funds designated for day-to-day operations.)

Cash and CDs on hand at the end of December was \$2.9 million. For the full year 2024 we are forecasting total revenue of \$3.3 million, of which \$3.0 million will come from homeowner annual assessments. Budgeted expenses forecast for 2024 is \$3.3 million with \$125,000 expected to transfer to our Reserve Fund. Through December, our revenue and expenses are in line with our forecast. However, we continue to monitor expenditures, and undergo higher pricing in products, labor, and availability. In addition, there remains a large "unknown" as to what may lie ahead with regards to home resales, interest rates and the overall economy in 2024.

REPLACEMENT RESERVE FUND

(Funds for major repairs / replacements / improvements)

Cash and CDs on hand at the end of December was \$4.5 million. In 2024 we are forecasting revenue of \$782,000. Revenue comes primarily from new homeowner preservation fees of \$633,000.

The 2024 reserve budget includes a transferred revenue of \$125,000 from the operating budget and projected interest of approximately \$24,000. Through December, interest revenue earned is approximately \$119,000 which exceeds our projected budget amount of \$24,000.

Reserve fund expenditures budgeted for 2024 is \$1,142,250. Ongoing expenditures remain planned for perimeter wall repair and painting, Lakes Complex Asphalt replacement, and the Fitness Center Architect. Other normal infrastructure repairs and replacements and expenditures will be addressed as needed.

These financials will be on file at the WVA Administration Office after noon on Thursday, February 6, 2025. The December Treasurers Report will be approved at the February 5 Board of Directors meeting and available the following day. - JACKPOT Bingo was held in January with 290 players and the Jackpot was \$1,000 split by two winners. Everyone had a great time, see you in February.
- Another successful Second Sundays Marketplace was held in January with Food and coffee trucks. Join us at the future Second Sundays Marketplace at the Lakes complex.
- Facilities is beginning on RFP's for some major upcoming projects in 2025. RV storage lot mill and repave and design and installation of the pickleball courts fencing. There will be discussion of these items at upcoming meetings and with the pickleball club President.
- Westbrook Posse continues to assist our residents in the village. Please stop by the Posse office and update your contact information in case of an emergency.







Claymates Pottery Club Featured Member JANE BECKMAN

In 2011 my husband and I decided to escape the snow and cold of Iowa and spend winters in Arizona. We were familiar with the Sun City area, but we did not know about Westbrook Village. We were privileged to rent a short-term stay at WV, and that sealed the deal!

In 2014 we decided to make WV our permanent home. One of the first things I did was join the Claymates Pottery Club. This gave me a place to work, be creative

and share ideas with others. I like to hand-build items like birdhouses, wall hangings, ornaments and trays and I also like sculpture, which I use mostly when I make yard totems. But my favorite activity is throwing pots on the wheel—it is relaxing for me.

Back in my college days, I earned a degree in Art and Education, and for 30 years I taught all mediums of art, but clay was always my favorite. When I had the opportunity, I joined the local art museum's pottery guild. The studio was in a very small concrete block building on a hillside overlooking the Mississippi River. Most members were retired and about twice my age. From these seasoned potters I learned how to hand build throw on a pottery wheel mix my own clay and glazes as well as try different firing techniques such as Raku and wood fire. Eventually I was able to purchase the pottery equipment I needed and I created my own studio in the basement of our home. This background made it easy to choose working with clay after retirement.



Through the club I am still able to do a little teaching for members who want to learn to "throw" on the potter wheel. The more I'm around other potters, the more I realize there are always new things to learn, even after 40 years working with clay.







Parking Enforcement on Public Roadways An Opportunity to be Heard with Your Vote



n 2023, Governor Hobbs signed HB-2298 into law. This law, Arizona Revised Statue 33-1818(B) will remove the HOA authority to administer parking on public roadways **unless** an HOA votes on the matter prior to June 30, 2025. Westbrook Village Association will be including this issue in the upcoming ballot that will be mailed to you in February.

This legislative change impacts public roads only. All other parking rules/restrictions will remain intact. The HOA will continue to enforce all other provisions as required by CC&Rs. Please note that sub-associations within Westbrook Village are encouraged to contact their community management company and/or attorney for clarification on what steps are necessary for your community to take. Please become informed on the issue and be sure to vote.

City of Peoria, AZ, Overnight parking restrictions:

- RVs, campers, and utility trailers must be parked in an enclosed garage or behind a solid fence. They can't be parked on public streets, except for loading and unloading.
- Commercial vehicles can't be parked in residential areas or within 300 feet of an occupied residence in nonresidential areas. They also can't be parked on any lot without proper zoning and site plan approvals.

Westbrook Village Parking Standard (amended 6-7-23)

- All vehicles, including but not limited to cars, pick-up trucks, commercial vehicles, motorcycles, recreational vehicles, and golf carts shall not be parked in the street overnight.
- Vehicle parking on front, side, or rear yards, front or rear patios, or on areas not designated for parking is prohibited. Designated parking is in the garage or parallel on the driveway.
- Parking on sidewalks, in front of or near neighboring driveways, golf course pathways, fire hydrants, or mailboxes so as to interfere with accessibility is prohibited.
- Recreational vehicles may be parked on the street or in driveways (size permitting) for up to 48 hours maximum for the purpose of loading or unloading.

Electronic Voting Is Coming to The Village

The WVA Board of Directors has voted to implement electronic voting for our upcoming 2025 election. Each property owner will receive a letter that will have a unique user code that identifies each property and instructions on voting. In addition to electronic voting, you will have the option to call and speak with the third-party facilitator to provide your vote over the phone or to request a paper ballot be mailed to you. Please note that any paper ballots mailed will have to be received by the third-party facilitator prior to the annual meeting. You cannot drop off ballots at the administration office or recreation centers.



This year's ballot will have three voting parts. We will be voting on the Parking Enforcement on Public Roadways, the three positions open for the Board of Directors and last year's annual meeting minutes.

When voting for the open board positions per our documents, we will continue to use cumulative voting. This year you will have three votes. Remember it is one ballot per property and don't vote until you are confident in your choices. You cannot change your vote once it is submitted. You will still have the option to vote in person at the annual meeting. In addition to the printed information in the magazine, on the e-blasts sent out by the association, and through the voting company, you will be able to pick up printed copies of the candidates biographs and minutes at the Recreation Centers' reception desk.

You can also watch the recording of the town hall to help answer any additional questions. Let's make this our best turnout ever!!!!





WV Hiking Club MARCH 2025 HIKE SCHEDULE

Mar 6 & 7 An Overnighter Leave Lakes parking lot about 7:30am on 3/6 and drive to just east of Green Valley (south of Tucson) in Madera Canyon/ Mt. Wrightson Wilderness. On 3/7 we will check out hopefully by 7:00 am, do our 2nd hike and return home. Total driving distance approx. 360 miles RT. We will need to make overnight arrangements and require preliminary count on who plans to attend by 2/6/25, and final count by 2/27/25 so overnight reservations can be completed.

Mar 6 Bog/Kent Springs Loop (New)– East of Green Valley in the Madera Canyon/Mt. Wrightson Wilderness – about 5.4 mile loop. Moderate to difficult – area is noted for bird watchers. Start in Bog Springs Campground, up & around shallow basin on western slopes of Santa Rita Mtns. Restrooms at TH. Driving distance approx. 350 miles RT.

Mar 7 Super/Old Baldy Loop (New) - East of Green Valley in Madera Canyon/Mt. Wrightson Wilderness – about 6.2 mile loop. Moderate to difficult. To Josephine Saddle, continue to the summit of Mt. Wrightson. Super trail on more arid south-facing slope. Steep & popular Old Baldy trail takes more northerly route and stays in trees. Restrooms at TH. Driving distance approx. 350 miles RT.

In general, hikes are classified as follows:

Easy – 2 to 4 miles with elevation gains up to 400 feet. Moderate – 4 to 7 miles with elevation gains up to 750 feet. Difficult – 7 or more miles with no limit on elevation gain. Total Ascent – adds all the up elevation changes together.

- Mar 14 Moon Rock/Levee/Cat Peak Loop Usery Mountain Regional Park. 6.0 mile loop. Easy to moderate. Sonoran desert with large stands of Chain Cholla. In and out of several washes and Cat Peaks for great views of Usery and Goldfield Mountains and Superstitions. Restrooms at TH. *Per vehicle fee*. Driving distance approx. 120 miles RT.
- Mar 21 Coyote Canyon/Bootlegger Loop Scottsdale McDowell Sonoran Preserve Northern Region – about a 6.1 mile loop. Moderate. Well defined trail-views of Mazatzal Mtns, Four Peaks, Weaver's Needle, etc. In & out of several washes, similar to slot canyon, pass by Crested Saguaro.
 Partially in Maricopa Trail system. Restroom at TH. Lunch at The Thumb. Driving distance approx. 80 miles RT.
- Mar 28 Biscuit Flat/Granite Loop Peoria Paloma Regional Preserve – about a 5.6 mile loop. Moderate to easy. Sonoran Mountain Ranch Park, first 2 miles is fairly flat. Use part of Compass Rose, New River, Keefer Hill, and Granite Trails, climb and descend a couple of small hills, some boulder outcroppings with a Crested Saguaro, partly rocky. Restrooms at TH. Driving distance approx. 20 miles RT.
- Mar 28 End of Year Party More information to come.
